You can also use these stickers to decorate your own books and notes, or for project work at school.



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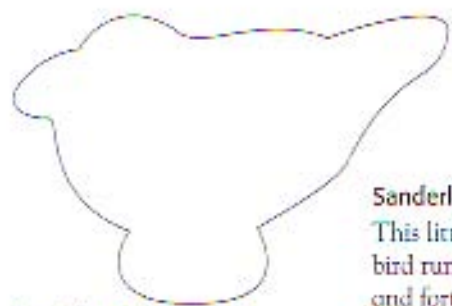
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At the seashore

A seascape is the perfect place for birds who love fishing over open water, nesting in a rocky perch, or strutting through sandy dunes. Some shore birds prefer one coast over another, while others can be seen in lots of different regions. You can pretend this beach is anywhere at all.



Laughing Gull

This gull's call sounds like laughter. Laughing Gulls sometimes steal food right out of a Brown Pelican's pouch!



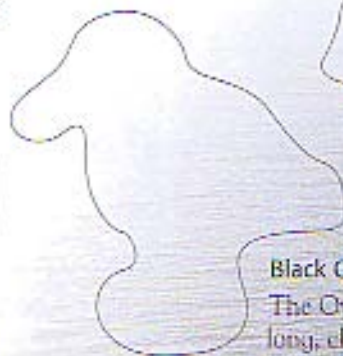
Sanderling

This little bird runs back and forth on the beach, looking for sand crabs as they wash ashore.



Atlantic Puffin

Puffins build their nests in burrows on the shore. Their strong wings let them fly in the air and swim underwater.



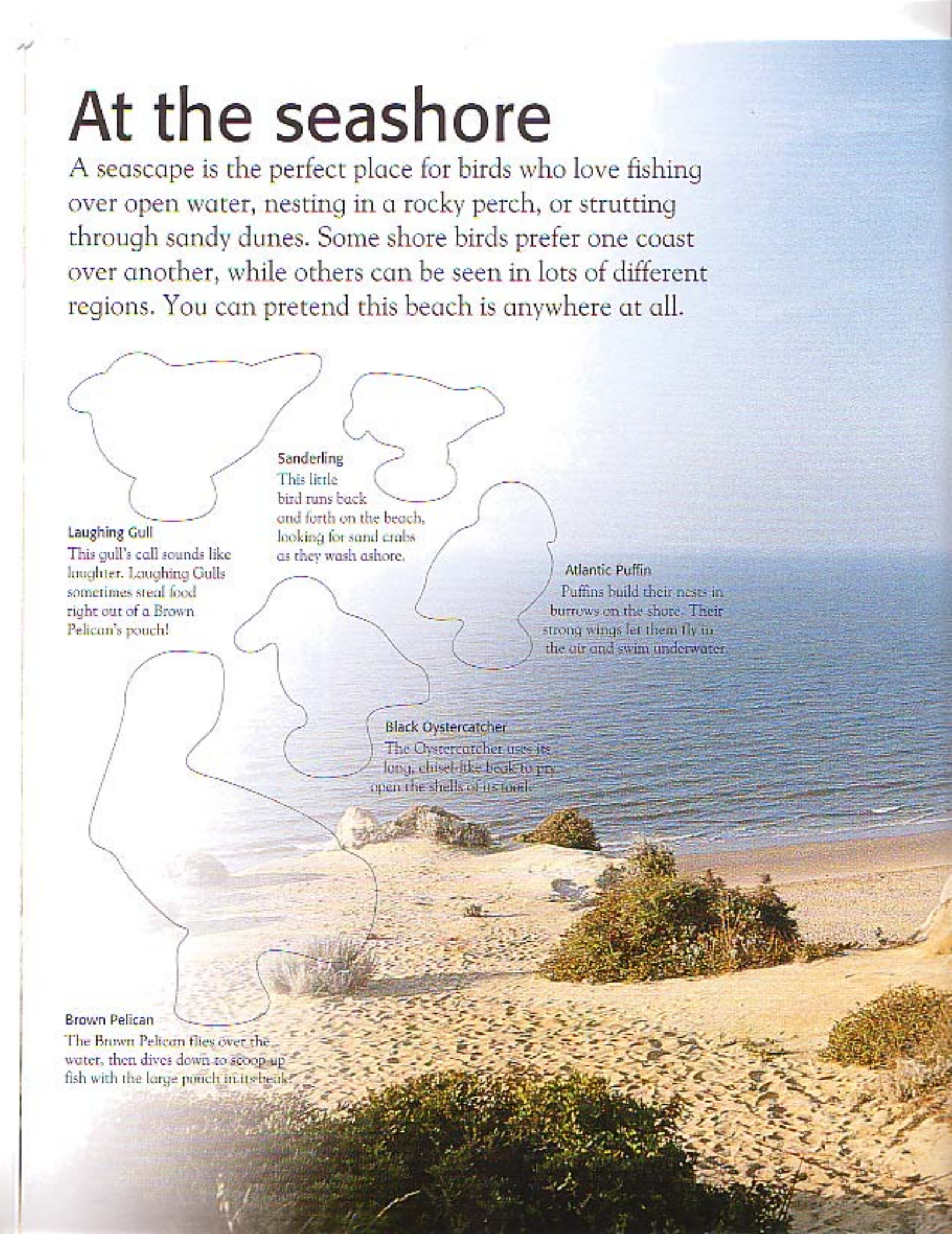
Black Oystercatcher

The Oystercatcher uses its long, chisel-like beak to pry open the shells of its food.



Brown Pelican

The Brown Pelican flies over the water, then dives down to scoop up fish with the large pouch in its beak.

but migrates through
many habitats



American Redstart
Lives mainly in
forests, but winters
in the tropics



Baltimore Oriole
Lives in woods,
neighborhoods, and
trees near streams



Eastern Phoebe
Lives in open woods
near streams or
other water



Golden Eagle
Lives on mountains
and other
rugged places



Black-and-white Warbler
Lives in woods
and forests



Song Sparrow
Especially likes brushy
areas near water



**Blue-gray
Gnatcatcher**
Lives in various
kinds of woods



Blue-headed Vireo
Lives in woods
or in trees
along streams



American Kestrel
Lives near woods
or in wooded
canyons



**Vermilion
Flycatcher**
Lives in trees
near water
sources



Ruby-crowned Kinglet
Lives in forests and
wooded yards



Pileated Woodpecker
Lives in forests, swamps,
woods, and cities



Scarlet Tanager
Stays mainly at
the tops of tall
trees in the woods



Rufous Hummingbird
Lives in woodlands,
meadows, and
mountains



Belted Kingfisher
Found wherever
there is water



Peregrine Falcon
Nests on cliffs or on
buildings in big cities
